

# JASPER KAY'S BIRD REPORT

## DECEMBER 1996

I always feel that the characteristic winter bird in this part of the country is the fieldfare, and this year is no exception. The trees, bushes and hedges of Long Drove and Rampton are full of these noisy, handsome birds. Often they are accompanied by redwings, which are less easy to identify. These small thrushes are perhaps easier to recognise by their yellow eye strips rather than by the red patch under the wing.

Otherwise, birds in winter are rather elusive. I have seen large flocks of skylarks in open fields, lapwings and wood pigeons in fields of winter wheat and goldfinches on thistle and teasel. A grey wagtail has spent some weeks by Broad Lane bridge and

a marsh harrier has been seen on Smithy Fen. A resident of Dunstal Field reported an injured heron in his garden, and a local beekeeper has objected to a greater spotted woodpecker putting its long tongue into the beehive to eat bees!

A few weeks ago, someone brought me a dead bird which she had hit while driving and the bird had lodged in her radiator grid. Experts and others were consulted and eventually we decided the bird was nothing more exciting than a chaffinch. But a dead bird is not easy to identify. So often we recognise a bird by its flight, its song, its feeding and its habitat, and a dead bird offers none of these.

For many of us, winter bird

watching is confined to a bird table in the garden, and this is endlessly fascinating. How many different birds do you see? You should be able to identify ten or twelve. Apart from the usual birds, we have had recent visits from a heron, pied wagtails, dun-nocks and jays. A neighbour has seen a rare over-wintering black-cap. We are now on the look out for siskins, woodpeckers and perhaps bramblings.

A few waxwings are reported on the Norfolk coast, but it would be surprising if they visited Cottenham again this year.

Over the years I have picked up the most amazing selection of animals in my taxi. No rats or snakes yet, but you never know! I don't mind picking up animals so long as they are well behaved, sit still and don't make a mess, but then I apply the same rules to people. The journey was 85 miles long and they used to sleep for 83 miles and then wake up and sniff the minute we got to Histon.

I am kneeling on the floor writing this while leaning on the sofa. My cat Malteser is on my back, cosy and purring and unaware that I am now writing about dogs. Sometimes when I get home he gives me a look which says it all...you've had a DOG in your taxi, how could you?

People sometimes order a taxi for an animal to go somewhere on its own. One lady asked me to take her elderly black labrador Arabellaah (she was very

posh!) all the way to Exeter. We decided that it would be an awful lot quicker by train, so the lady paid my fare and Arabellaah's, I put on my Barbour and orf we went, travelling across London in a black London cab, all expenses paid.

One is perhaps not supposed to have favourite customers, but there is one customer who I pick up on Christmas Day with whom I am quite smitten. When I go to pick him up I always put the travel rug on the back seat, open the door and in he leaps - all six and a half stone of him, taking up nearly all the back seat. His name is Womble and he is a very big, very fluffy, white German Shepherd dog, and he's GORGEOUS. P.S. Don't tell my cat.

# No to Tower

**The voice of the village, in the form of over 100 letters of protest, helped ensure that the District Council said 'no' to a planning application for a 100 foot high telecommunications mast in Lambs Lane. Opposition to the proposal was led by our District Councillors, the Parish Council, the Village Design Group and other groups and individuals who helped raise awareness of the threat. Two leaflets showing 'architects' impressions' of the tower in situ drew additional press coverage for the village campaigns.**

Rejection of the tower was on the grounds that it would appear intrusive and overbearing both within the village and as viewed from outside; and that it would be contrary to the guidelines of the Village Design Statement.

The Lambs Lane proposal brings home to Cottenham an issue of continuing, and wider concern. The new communications technologies, though 'wireless', depend on a rapidly growing number of mast structures in commanding positions which seem set to become

inescapable landmarks of the modern countryside.

## Village Design Group AGM

The Group's AGM is on 13 February (7.45 pm at the Village College). We're delighted to have as our guest speaker Jeremy Belcham, Planning Officer at South Cambs District Council, talking about development control in Cottenham, and the effects of the Village Design Statement. This meeting is a must for anyone interested in how the village is growing and changing. Admission is free and all are welcome, members and non-members. If you are a member wanting to get more involved, for example by joining the Group's committee, please be sure to come along.

## Cottenham's Village Design Statement leads national policy

A major national initiative 'that would help to shape the appearance of our countryside over the next 50 years' has been launched by the Countryside Commission, thanks in part to the

efforts of Cottenham residents.

The Commission's aim is to curb the spread of mass-produced, standardised building in rural areas by encouraging local communities to produce village design statements - 'making local character count in new development'.

Cottenham is one of four 'pilot' villages where the viability of this policy was tested, and the effectiveness of our Design Statement has helped to make the concept a reality. The Commission has published its guidance to communities wishing to draw up Design Statements; the pack 'Village Design' incorporates Cottenham's Design Statement as a model! An accompanying video 'Village Views' also features Cottenham, its Design Statement and Design Group.
