

# BROAD LANE UPDATE

**The Cottenham Village Design Group had a meeting with a representative of Beazer Homes and their architect, Peter Ellis, last October. The discussion was wide ranging: not just focusing on housing design, but also on the provision of open space, access (by road and foot), and landscaping/conservation.**

The proposed development in Broad lane is for 280 houses. The master plan and the first phase for 45 houses near Broad Lane has received approval from the district council. There are 'planning gains' for the village, including three acres of playing fields behind Lambs Lane and a flag pole at the primary school. Between this and the Denmark Road site, the village will expand by about 25%. The group feel that it is a pity that the development is exclusively housing. This would be a valuable opportunity to provide other amenities for the vil-

lage, for employment and leisure.

As a result of the Design Statement, Beazer Homes appointed an architect to design housing that reflects the character of the village rather than using stock designs that one might find anywhere in the country (Beazer are said to be the 4th largest house builders in Britain). The Design Group are on the whole pleased with the designs, with only a few minor details regarding materials causing concern. The general layout of the scheme was also praised as was the provision of extensive open space around the moat.

Detailed proposals for landscaping have come before the planning department but have not yet been discussed by the Design Group. We have been assured that existing trees around the moat will be protected and that new planting will be provided in and around the development.

While pedestrian access is to be provided to the High Street at a number of points (some contentious), it is felt that these are insufficient. It is understood that there is concern among residents nearby that a lack of foot access will encourage greater car use along Broad Lane. The Design Group also hope that it may be possible to establish a new footpath into open countryside from the scheme

Further details can be had from the local councils. The Design Group will endeavour to provide updates through the Newsletter.

# JASPER KAY'S BIRD REPORT

## February 1997

Our "Birdwatch 97" has got off to a flying start! We are a group of about fifteen people who are keeping a bird diary for each month of the year. Our observations are then pooled and we can begin to build up a picture of bird life throughout the year in the Fen Edge Patch.

During January we recorded 73 different species. These included some birds which are nationally on the decline - corn bunting, tree sparrow, grey partridge and coal tit - and two unusual birds which are very shy and therefore seldom seen. One is a woodcock seen in undergrowth in Millfield, and the other is a water rail, seen in the ditch near the sewage works in Broad Lane.

Goosanders were twice seen on the Great Ouse River near

Twentypence, and little grebe were spotted near Lockspit. We have also seen tufted duck, gadwall, pochard, teal and great crested grebe. The grey wagtail seen several times near Broad Lane bridge recently seems to have moved nearer to the sewage works. A tawny owl has been heard in Rampton and three long-eared owls were seen at the north end of Long Drove.

Fieldfares and redwings seem to have been particularly abundant this year and we have also been aware of an increase in woodpeckers, longtailed tits, jays, corn buntings and redlegged partridges. Less common than usual are bullfinches, snipe and tree creepers. February 14th - Valentine's Day - is sometimes called "The Birds Wedding Day"! This year there were certainly

signs of spring in the air. Large flocks of fieldfares and lapwings were seen high in the sky heading north, many birds were singing and black headed gulls were starting to regain their black heads, their summer breeding plumage. By the end of March we may see the first of the summer visitors, chiffchaff, willow warblers or perhaps whitethroats.

Visitors to Welney may have been lucky enough to see two unusual visitors, a snow goose and a canvasback, which is a pochard-like duck normally resident in North America and making its first recorded visit to Britain. Nearer home, an enthusiastic birder spotted a peacock in a tree on Rampton Green. If anyone would like to join Birdwatch 97, please get in touch.

The Charity Commission have now approved the scheme for the administration of the above Charity.

## **BENEFITS OF CHARITY**

a) In providing for any school in, or substantially serving, the area of benefit, books or equipment not otherwise normally provided as may be agreed between the Trustees and the Governors or Managers of the school concerned;

b) In promoting either by means of Sunday Schools or in such other ways as the Trustees think fit the religious instruction of persons who are resident in the area of benefit;

c) In the provision of financial assistance to any voluntary organisation having charitable objects directed to educating or improving the condition of life of persons resident in the area of benefit by developing their physical, mental and moral capacities through their leisure time activities;

d) In promoting the education of persons who are resident in the area of benefit and who are in need of financial assistance in either or both of the following ways:

1) in awarding to such persons exhibitions scholarships, bursaries, grants or maintenance allowances tenable at any school, university college of education or other institution of higher education approved for the purpose by the Trustees;

2) in providing financial assistance, outfits, clothing, tools, instruments or books to assist such persons to pursue their education (including the study of music and other arts) and to prepare for or enter a profession, trade, occupation or service on leaving school, university or other educational establishment;

e) In otherwise promoting the education of persons resident in the area of benefit.

Within the limits prescribed by the scheme, the Trustees shall

have the power to make rules for the award of exhibitions, scholarships, bursaries, grants, maintenance allowances or other benefits, including rules as to the value and period of tenure of the awards, and the qualifications and the methods of ascertainment and selection of candidates for benefit.

The Trustees shall have regard to the desirability of consulting the local education authority as to their general action under this clause and, if occasion requires, as to the educational qualifications of candidates for benefit.

The Trustees cannot apply income of the Charity directly in relief of rates, taxes or other public funds.

The area of benefit shall mean the Parishes of Cottenham and Rampton and benefits under section d) above are restricted to the residents of these parishes.

Further information and application forms can be obtained from the Clerk to the Trustees.

Meetings of the Trustees will take place during April and October annually, applications must be received by the Clerk to the Trustees before 31st March and 30th September for consideration by the Trustees at their annual meetings.

# LETTERS to the Editors

## Dear Editors

I would like to relate an incident that I witnessed in this village at half term. I watched from my window as two girls of about eleven walked by, followed by three younger boys, no more than ten. One of the boys put his arm around one of the girls, the way that teenagers do. From behind it was difficult to tell the girl's reaction, she didn't respond in kind. This being the case, the boy moved his hand down and groped the girl's behind in a very intrusive manner. Shortly afterwards, the three boys broke away and went off in another direction; they didn't appear to say goodbye as if friends.

I could be completely wrong about what I saw, it could all

have been quite innocent. However, bearing in mind their age and the lack of response from the girl, I imagine she was too frightened to resist the boy's assault. If you are laughing at this story, or wondering what the fuss is about (just high spirits after all) then maybe some reflection is needed about the effect that a boy behaving in this way might have on a young girl.

If this boy is happy to behave in such a manner in the open, then I can't help but wonder if he is a persistent threat to girls in the village.. What will he be doing in a few years time when adolescence arouses his "interest" in girls still further? I don't know the boy concerned but many people surely do.
