

FUNDRAISING BEGINS FOR ALL SAINTS' CHURCH HALL PROJECT


The Parish Church of Cottenham is famous for its unusual tower, but before this was built there was a steeple. This fell during a severe storm in 1617 demolishing a schoolroom which stood to the north side of the church. In 1699 another schoolroom was built beside the church for teaching local boys, paid for by Mrs. Katherine Pepys, a relation of the famous Samuel Pepys. How long this stood, we are not sure. What we do know is that in 1852 the then new Rector of Cottenham, The Rev'd Samuel Banks, paid for a large schoolroom to be built next to the stables in the Rectory grounds. His wife and daughter taught local girls here.

However, for most of its existence this 'room' has been used as the hall for All Saints' Church. It is the building that still stands today on the opposite side of the road to the church. After almost one hundred and fifty years of service to the church and community, the building has sadly reached the end of its long

life. This was confirmed by two alarming structural survey reports. Anyone who has used the building of late will know what a poor state it is in.

Over recent years there has been much discussion and thought given to its future and the ever increasing needs of the church and parish.

More than fifty children are now members of the Sunday Club, but as well as church groups, the hall is used regularly by Cottenham Brass, the Clog Dancers, and for concerts, sales and many other activities. The facilities, however, are very limited. The rotten windows, sagging roof, bulging walls, rising damp, rotting floor joists and subsidence all add to the general air of decay.

Serious consideration was given to restoration of this much loved building, but the structure is in such a poor state, it was agreed unanimously by the Church Council to seek permission to rebuild. The Bishop of Ely, as Patron of All Saints' Church, backs our proposals. Meetings have been held with the Conservation and Planning Officers for the area who assisted greatly by informing us what would and would not be allowed in this sensitive conservation area of the village. Members of the congregation who regularly used the hall had already been asked for their requirements and eventually a specification was prepared. Local architects were invited to present plans and after much deliberation the Hall Committee recommended to the PCC the acceptance of a design by William Miller Associates.

I am pleased to say that we now have an exciting design for a building that is in keeping with the Conservation Area yet offering much more flexible and usable accommodation than now. The design follows the lines of the existing building and includes a reminder of the Old Rectory stables that stood where the modern extension now stands. The plans include

using as much material from the original building as is salvageable. Our plans are obviously subject to planning permission being granted, but I hope you will agree that this new hall will be a valuable asset for church and village alike and in keeping with the history of our church, where, over the last few centuries, the appropriate facilities have always been built to meet the needs of the time. **NOW WE HAVE TO RAISE THE FUNDS!**

The exact cost is unknown at present, but is likely to be in the region of £180,000, a huge figure to have to find.

The target may seem unattainable, but if we could find out of our population of five thousand people just one hundred and fifty who would donate under Covenant or Gift Aid the sum of £250 each year for four years, we should know that we could proceed. Let me assure you that every gift, however small, will be appreciated, and there will be plenty of opportunities to help with fund raising.

A FOOTPATH FOR THE MILLENNIUM?

It's not so much those who can use the dual use cycle and footpath from here to Histon as those who would like to, but daren't, such as wheelchair users/pushers, young cyclists, those with big prams that I feel sorry for. Even on the fine days of this summer, very few of these used the path; it's too narrow and too close to the motor traffic.

However, our Parish Council met on 2 September and agreed it was inadequate, and are writing to the District and County Councils about it. Now that it is "officially" inadequate, our letters of concern to Mr. D. Hussell, Director of Planning at South Cambs. District Council and/or Mr. B. Smith, Director of Environment and Transport at

Cambridgeshire County Council, will add weight to the case for getting something done.

Though it is good for the cyclists that they have got the support of the Parish Council, not all of them deserve it. There are those who are not only riding on the pavement (tut,tut) but also riding in a rather aggressive manner that has scared some of the older residents.

But I still think we are concentrating too much on the cyclists; radical improvement to the present way will be expensive because of the ditch on the other side, so for a little more we could possibly have a proper path through the fields, which would make a walk to Histon and back a pleasant recreation for a

sunny afternoon. After all, it is the Millennium soon. Have we yet got a better "project" with which to celebrate? *Randall Foggie*



The Parish Council has also sent us a note regarding footpaths and cyclists - they have received a number of complaints regarding various incidents regarding adults and older children riding on the village footways. Members of the Parish Council felt that a warning should be issued locally of the dangers of this illegal use of footpaths and pavements, while stressing the fact that they are of course aware that the current road situation does encourage and sometimes force cyclists on to the footways in the village.

THEATRICAL SPEAKER FOR DESIGN GROUP

December 4th, Cottenham Village College, 8.00pm. After the packed house for Mac Dowdy's fascinating talk last winter, the Village Design Group's December event offers another behind the scenes view of buildings. Our speaker is Barry Brown, of Cambridge firm Brown, Bland and Cole, architects of the renovation of the Cambridge Arts Theatre.

Barry Brown is an architect with a

strong belief in buildings which discreetly fit their context. In his illustrated talk he will show how he met the challenges of the Arts Theatre and other building projects where contemporary design and functions have been accommodated within the constraints of historic settings. Barry Brown's experience of the Arts Theatre goes back to his days in Footlights, so expect a lively evening.

JASPER KAY'S BIRD REPORT - OCTOBER

Most of us when we are out and about quite rightly look where we are going. We keep our eyes firmly on the path, the pavement or the road. But for a bird watcher it is often worthwhile to stop and look up. In late September I saw a peregrine falcon high above the Village College and watched it make its spectacular dive. A few days later another observer saw it (or another one) above Long Drove. At the same time two buzzards were seen circling above the High Street.

Some house martins were still looking after their young in early October. Birds nesting in Telegraph Street suddenly disappeared - did the whole family leave together or did the parents abandon their young?

Many birds flock together at this time of year. Crows, jackdaws and

starlings are all feeding, roosting and flying around near to the centre of the village. Further out there are flocks of noisy mistle thrushes in trees and hedges, the fields have flocks of lapwings and there are mixed groups of finches and buntings in the stubble. These could be greenfinches, chaffinches, linnets, reed buntings, yellowhammers, corn buntings and sparrows.

No sooner had the last house martins and swallows disappeared but the winter birds began to arrive. I saw fieldfares in Church Lane on October 17th and on Long Drove two days later.

Our Birdwatch 97 project is now into its final two months. So far we have recorded 113 different species in the area, and this does not include the peacock which has made its home on Rampton Green!

COTTENHAM VILLAGE SOCIETY

The Village Society was formed in 1970, when its objectives were - and still are - "to encourage high standards of architecture and village planning, to stimulate public interest in the history, beauty and character of the area and to encourage the preservation, development and improvement of features of general amenity or historical interest".

Over the past 27 years, the Society has undertaken many projects, including bulbs planted on the Village Green, the old pump and horse trough re-sited on the Green, a bird bath and sundial presented to the Community Garden, a seat presented to the Methodist Church, ten publications on the history of Cottenham (still available, contact Francis Garrett on 01223 355747) and donations to the Parish Council for the upkeep of the Village Sign and to the Library for a subscription to the Cambridgeshire Journal (this is now instead of the annual Diary).

The Society is now looking for new members to join them for their regular programme of events throughout the year, with monthly meetings from September to April and a number of summer events. Annual subscription is only £3.00 a year, and all are welcome to join. FEN REEVES COMMUNITY WOODLAND UPDATE

Although there does not seem to be much action these days from the Fen Reeves Woodland group, we are still active in ensuring that the woodland is available as an amenity to our village. For those who have visited the woodland over the past few months, you will have seen how well the trees have been growing with some now 7-8ft. tall. The pond at the Lode end of the woodland was planted up with a variety of pond plants and the water lilies have flowered well in their first year.

We suffered very much in the early part of 1997 from vandals who seemed hellbent on causing as much damage as possible, and from some who found hare and rabbit coursing a good excuse to

pull down the netting around the boundary. Again, money has had to be spent on providing rabbit guards to individual trees rather than improving the woodland for the public benefit.


