

COTTENHAM ONLY MILDLY AFFECTED BY MILLENNIUM BUG!

Are we in Cottenham planning to go quietly into the year 2000? Or are we pedantic and waiting for the real new millennium celebrations on Jan 1 2001? As far as we can see, plans for the end of this year in Cottenham are low-key.

Some time ago the parish council balloted village opinion to see if there was support for it to spend money to mark the dawn of the year 2000. Of the 1900 circulars sent out, 160 were returned. Of these, there was no conclusive support for a major event. Therefore, the parish council plans to mark the millennium by giving all children of primary school age or younger a commemorative mug made by the pottery at Wilburton. Other plans for the New Year celebrations include circling the village green with

Christmas lights and placing a number of commemorative seats on the village green.

These plans are worthy and credit is due to the organisers. However, there are no plans, that we are aware of, to bring the village together to mark an event that happens only once every thousand years.

Cottenham is a remarkably active village. Every year the calendar is punctuated with events from the fun run (which is proceeding as this article is being written), to the feast parade and the spectacular fireworks display, which is hosted by the primary school every 5th of November. These events are always well organised and well supported by the people of the village. Funfairs and circuses are regular visitors to the village green. There is always something going on.

It seems strange then that, when the rest of the world parties, we in Cottenham will be watching others on the television rather than doing something ourselves.

But what could we do? The ballot held by the parish council shows that there is no mandate for them to spend significant money on a celebration. Clearly, if anything is to happen then it will need to be self funding. However, many such events already exist in the village and there is a wealth of organisational talent to be drawn upon.

What form could the celebration take? An obvious possibility would be to have a firework display in the early evening of Dec 31 to get the village together. Other events, such as a sponsored 'walk in the frost' could be organised for 1 January 2000. Indoor

TOY STORY

Kids bored with their toys from Christmas? The Ferbie been abandoned at the back of the cupboard? Don't feel like splashing out on yet more but want to keep them happy just the same?

There is an alternative to an expensive trip to the toy shop

What is it?

It's the Cottenham Toy Library!

It works like this. You join the Toy Library for just £1 and you and your child get to choose from a great selection of games and toys at our meetings held in the Salvation Army Barn twice a month. Each item is borrowed for between 30p and £1 per session. While they're choosing a toy or playing with the other children you can have a sit down, a cup of coffee and a chat with the mums, dads and carers.

Toy Library is run by volunteer mums and dads just like you, who know the value of play and having different toys to stimulate your child. To work properly Toy Library needs new members all the time, to borrow the toys and help with fundraising to make sure we have sufficient funds to replace old and damaged toys and to buy new ones.

The enthusiastic committee keep it all running smoothly throughout the year and organises numerous events to raise extra money. We held a very successful Nearly New Sale in

March.

Last July, we had a Teddy Bears' Picnic and picnickers with Teddies in tow enjoyed a ball-pool, and ice-creams in the sunshine. The children tried out many of the Toy Library's larger outdoor toys such as the trampoline, slide, and Playhouse. We'll be putting up posters later in the year advertising the next Picnic.

In June and November, we had cake stalls to sell homemade cakes and buns to shoppers in the village and raise some funds for the Toy Library. If you can pledge a cake for this year's cake stall, get in touch.

In October, we marked PlayMatters Week with a fun afternoon where children and parents enjoyed music and storytelling sessions. Also in October, we again took part in Cottenham's Feast Parade. You may have seen our decorated trailer complete with Jack-in-a-box and Toy Library toys. We gave out more than 100 leaflets telling people about Toy Library.

There were lots of other events throughout the year as well as the regular sessions, including a Christmas Fun Morning, all of which helped to boost funds so we could buy more new toys, such as dolls buggies, toddler kitchen, Duplo Farm, electric train set, trampoline, slide, even a junior microscope and some educational electronic toys. We've just taken delivery of a xylophone; bought

with a grant from the Cottenham British Schools Trust.

There's plenty of choice for you and the kids! Why not give Toy Library a try - it's a much nicer and far less expensive way to keep the children happy than another trip to the toy shop!

WATCHING BRIEF

How now, Macbeth?

Of course we take it for granted that we have a chemist here in Cottenham. Just a short step from the doctors' surgeries, we can exchange a prescription or just drop it in and pick up the goods later. Imagine having to go to Milton, Bar Hill or Cambridge.

We hear in the news that small local pharmacies are under threat from the Great and Greedy. It may be a good time to stop and reflect on just what we have here – and on what we can do to ensure that our chemist doesn't become a casualty of commerce.

Mr Macbeth's pharmacy is a gem. Just like the quirky building it occupies, the shop is unashamedly old-fashioned. There's no brash shop-frontage or aggressive signage. What you see is what you get – a little store where providing a service to the community is valued more highly than a quick profit. The staff are gentle, helpful and – amazingly rare in shops these days – they actually know what they have in stock and what it's for. And if you need some advice about how to deal with minor ailments, Mr Macbeth or his deputy pharmacist will often oblige.

The shop can even outperform its urban rivals in some instances. For

example, Mrs Watchman tells me that, having failed to find a new make-up bag while Christmas shopping in Cambridge, she found the very thing at Macbeth's – at half the price she'd have expected to pay in town.

Indeed, Macbeth's is pretty much how village shops used to be. But this is no time for sentiment and nostalgia. For practical reasons we must take heed of the growing pressures on small pharmacies.

If the big players get their way, we shall end up having to trek to Milton or wherever to get our prescriptions changed. For the able-bodied it will be an inconvenience; for the sick and elderly it will be devastating. And for the village of Cottenham it will be one more erosion of those things which make this place unique.

So what do we do? Simple. We support Mr Macbeth, his loyal staff and the service they so excellently provide. Go there for all your shampoo, painkillers, toothbrushes, medicines, hot water bottles, toiletries, hair slides, photo-processing, prophylactics, reading glasses, indigestion remedies, *etc* – and sound medical advice too.

Mrs Watchman's make-up bag aside, it's true that in some cases you might have to pay a little more than you would at the supermarket – but not half as much as it would cost long-term if we were to lose our

delightful local pharmacy.

When the chips are down

Like many people, Watchman is becoming increasingly worried by the advancing spectre of the millennium bug. All this talk of chips going crazy as the clock strikes midnight on New Year's Eve is disturbing.

Can we be certain that the Cottenham Chip Shop will have its stock well under lock and key as we wend our way home in the early hours of the 21st century? And that the Co-op will have the lid firmly closed on the McCain's freezer compartment?

Think about all those domestic fridge-freezers as well. Watchman's advice is to take nothing for granted in the matter of pharmacies or millennium bugs. Prepare for the worst-case scenario. Ask yourself now: what would you do if you were suddenly confronted by a gang of enraged crinkle-cut oven chips?

COTTENHAM PARISH COUNCIL

The traffic saga continues. While parking restrictions at the Margett Street/High Street junction have finally been given the go-ahead subject to any objections from residents in the area, we seem to be making little progress on the matter of speed restrictions in Histon Road. The Council is asking the County Council to find an alternative to width restrictions. The latter would, we feel, cause unacceptable tail-backs at peak periods.

A resident has complained about the frequent deliveries by large articulated vehicles to the Co-op store, pointing out that this causes obstruction, noise and is potentially dangerous in view of the location of the entrance on a sharp bend. The Council has had discussions on this subject with the Co-op management in the past, and it is obvious that in order for the business to operate, deliveries must be made. However, manoeuvring any sizeable vehicle is made much more difficult if customers at the shop persist in parking thoughtlessly near the entrance, sometimes blocking it completely. In any case, parking at this point creates a hazard for normal road users and pedestrians. PLEASE DO

NOT PARK on this corner - there is a perfectly good car park behind the store, accessible from Denmark Road.

The annual Parish Meeting, was held on Wednesday 21st April at the Village College, but was poorly attended. This is disappointing in view of the fact that this is the one occasion in the year when residents are by law given the opportunity to express their views to the Council in a public meeting. However those that were present were unanimous in their concern about one matter: the level of petty crime, vandalism and criminal damage occurring in the village. In an earlier issue, we reported that the official statistics indicate that Cottenham is no worse than any other village of its size: that is no consolation if you are unfortunate enough to be a victim. Some of the incidents may appear trivial, and therefore may not be reported to the Police. This means that they are not recorded in the statistics, and unfortunately it seems to be a fact of today's life that unless the figures prove it, the problem does not exist! The Council will of course be making representations to the Police, but there is one thing that everyone can do - MAKE SURE

ALL INCIDENTS, HOWEVER TRIVIAL, ARE REPORTED TO THE POLICE. And when you do, ASK FOR AN INCIDENT NUMBER, without which the matter may not be included in the official statistics.

It is unfortunate in the light of the last paragraph that a rumour has surfaced suggesting that Cottenham is to lose its Community Beat Officer. The Council has received assurances from Insp. Howells at Histon that this is not the case. Although P.C. Dave Sayward is being transferred to a post in Cambridge, we are informed that the vacancy he leaves behind will be filled as soon as possible, (perhaps by the time this Newsletter is published). In the meantime an officer from the Histon sector will be assigned to give special attention to Cottenham. The Council would like to record its appreciation to Dave Sayward for his co-operation during his 2 1/2 years with us, and wish him every success in his new appointment.

The only method of cooking meat on an 18th century man-of-war was boiling in a large communal pot. Each Mess, the name given to a group of seamen who fed together, attached their mess number to the joint so that they could recover it after cooking. The ship's cook was responsible for ensuring that the pot did not boil dry, and for removing the residue that floated to the surface, known as 'slush'. OLD COTTENHAM – BOYHOOD MEMORIES

I have many indelible boyhood memories of the 30's. RAF Supermarine Spitfires from Duxford overhead. The colourful Romany caravan, that appeared annually in the little drift-way, halfway up Barrow Hill. Newts swimming in the meadow ponds. Horse drawn binders at harvest-time, and Mr E. Smith's traction engine at threshing-time, "steaming" with its drum, elevator and chaff cutter.

"Prince Abagasha" dancing on red-hot irons at Cottenham Feast, and the gifts of pink and white sugar mice at Christmas from our form mistress, Miss Jeeps, who cycled every day from Willingham to teach at the old Margett Street School. Great!

Over the course of the next few issues, I will share some of my memories with you, and reflect on a bygone time in Old Cottenham.

In the 1930's, Cottenham United F.C. played their home matches in 'Ivatts Field' off Histon Road, where Dunstal Field Estate is situated now. A pleasant football ground with its undulating playing surface. Visiting

teams referred to it as 'Cottenham's Celery Trenches'. If I were fortunate enough to be taken there by my older brother to watch a match, Mr Moore would be among the supporters. In those days, large crowds watched local matches, but Mr Moore was given space! His feet moved with the rhythm of the game, kicking out excitedly if Cottenham were on the attack. If they scored, his shout of "GAUL" would be heard. He owned a tricycle, which he rode in Rook Street really slowly, so slow in fact that Mr Fred Badcock's shire horses Blossom and Daisy muck carting with Tumbrel carts, had great difficulty overtaking him at times, as they headed for Long Drove and the Fen. Mr Moore always held the centre of the road. Mr Moore was a little man, round faced with a grey moustache and stubbly chin, he always wore a cap. He was known with locally affection as "Jimmy Ting".

Finally, may I add, that the characters and names I mention are remembered with admiration, affection and the greatest respect.

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JASPER KAY'S BIRD REPORT

April 99

"Can you come? There's a strange bird in the garden". I abandon my cup of tea, grab my binoculars and jump on my bike. Usually, by the time I arrive, the bird has gone! But this time, luck was on my side, and several of us were able to watch a black redstart, (yes, that really is its name!) in Beagles Court in the centre of the village. The bird is a little larger than a sparrow, rather dull brown in colour, but when it flicks its tail, it shows a rich reddish brown colour. It is quite common in the mountains of continental Europe and I am told that it liked bombed sites in London after the war. Indeed, one spent a week in King's Cross Station! In any case, it is a first in Cottenham in recent years.

Another unusual bird reported is a wryneck. Three were seen on two occasions in a garden on the High

Street. They belong to the woodpecker family and have a complex patterned plumage of brown and grey. Some summer birds were recorded here during the first week of April - chiffchaff, blackcap, willow warbler and swallow, but the bigger flocks have clearly been delayed by the cold weather. The Long Drove 'lagoon' has provided much interest. The birds seen there regularly include oyster catchers, redshank, lapwings, shelduck and herons. A sparrowhawk paid a swift visit to our bird table and another was seen snatching a robin from a garden near the Village College. A kingfisher has been seen again on the Cottenham Lode, and common sandpipers on the Old West river. In spite of the cold weather, breeding has been evident. As I write (mid-April), there are large young blackbirds and thrushes in the garden

being fed by their overworked parents.
